#### Trivia Night!

#### Mount Stromlo Tactile Galaxy Night

Mount Stromlo Observatory will introduce a pilot astronomy event designed for blind and vision-impaired audiences, inspired by *The Tactile Universe* project from the University of Portsmouth (Bonne et al., 2018). This program combines a guided exploration of Mount Stromlo's history with a hands-on "Tactile Galaxy" session, using 3D-printed models of astronomical objects visible from the site. Participants will learn about the Milky Way and the life cycle of stars through touch and inclusive narration, offering a non-visual pathway into astronomy.

# **Griffin Centre Lift Upgrade**

Infrastructure Canberra has commenced work towards delivery of the new lift components in the Griffin Centre. The left side lift when you walk into the building – is the first and has already been dismantled and will be replaced from basement 2. The

right side lift continues to operate so our members can access levels 1 and 2 when required. Fortunately, there has been limited noisy periods during the demolition works.

Currently workmen have placed hoarding around the first lift on each level which has not impacted on any of our members/clients visiting CBS rooms or attending activities on other levels.

When right side lift commences an exclusion zone will be required in the foyer on the ground floor, additionally where required tactiles may be applied to assist with wayfinding. Each floor will also likely require some minor exclusion zones as the team works their way through the building.

Signage has been applied throughout Griffin Centre indicating site contacts please reach out both before and during the works with any queries or concerns. CBS-EFLC staff will update all members and clients throughout the process.

# The Way I See It - By Graham Downie

Inaccessible touch screens are the enemy of people who are blind or vision impaired and of people without the dexterity to use them, yet they increasingly pervade appliances and commercial devices.

Arguably most appliances which rely exclusively on inaccessible touch screens breach Australia's Disability Discrimination Act, but this has done nothing to prevent their proliferation, replacing keypads or knobs to control or communicate with devices. This is not a new concern but one which has received no serious attention in Australia by governments or manufacturers. Much has been done to require physical access for people using wheelchairs; indeed, billions of dollars have been spent modifying railway stations, buses and buildings to provide wheelchair access,. That is as it should be.

But little if anything has been done to require manufacturers to provide universal access to their products.

A touch screen need not be inaccessible. Gestures and/or voice commands are used on Apple and Android devices. Though for some tasks a keyboard is still far easier. Westpac has recently issued a short video explaining how people who are blind can use its EFTPOS terminals. This was necessary because the bank has introduced terminals which have only a touch screen and no keypad. So instead of simply keying in one's PIN, it is now necessary to put the terminal into access mode, then navigate the screen guided by external tactile markers and respond to tones as your finger navigates the screen.

At least there has been an attempt to make the terminals accessible. But there are clearly shortcomings, easily overcome with the provision of a keypad. This is not to say touch screens should not be available, particularly to people with a disability who find a screen easier to manage than a keypad.

I tried by telephone to speak to someone at Westpac who would discuss accessibility questions. This proved to be a waste of my time and the bank's staff member. I had asked that she arrange for me to speak with someone responsible for this technology. I received a standard, no-reply email which indicated the staff member had no understanding of the issue.

I emailed Westpac's media relations asking why Westpac had introduced EFTPOS terminals which required adaptation instead of a simple tactile keypad. At time of writing there has been no reply.

Of course, Westpac is not the only nor the major culprit with the use of touch screens. It is difficult to find appliances, such as stoves, cooktops, refrigerators, televisions, even digital radios which are easily accessible by people who cannot see the screen. The good news is there are some solutions, even quite simple ones, for people who are blind to access touch screens. Tactile markers, which can be supplied by CBS, can be a reasonable solution on some household products. This is not generally an option on external devices such as ATMs, EFTPOS terminals and lifts.

In such cases, more advanced technology can help, though this depends on people having a smart phone. Be My Eyes and Aira used real people and artificial intelligence to help with many tasks. I have used Be My Eyes with human assistance to navigate the computer mouse on a terrible form by Operoo. This company has not made its forms accessible despite my complaint to the Human Rights Commission about three years ago. I digress. There are numerous smart glasses which with AI or human can help with many tasks. Perhaps a look at these in a future edition.

For managing an EFTPOS payment, the best solution for me is my smart watch. It avoids the need for a PIN. You do not even need your card with you.

To use your smart watch or smart phone, you put your card on to the Apple or Android wallet. When a payment is required, activate the wallet, select the appropriate card and point your device at the EFTPOS terminal. This is arguably more secure than using a physical card. There is a bit more to it which I am happy to explain personally to anyone interested.

Though there are ways of managing many tasks, there is no excuse for making what were easily managed tasks more difficult or impossible with inaccessible touch screens.

#### **Recipe from August Sens-able Cooking**

#### Chicken curry for 10 people!

#### Ingredients:

- 1.5 kg chicken can be pieces or chopped meat
- 4 red onions chopped
- 4 tomatoes diced
- 50g ginger
- 1 garlic bulb
- 1 tablespoon spoon of each cumin, coriander, turmeric powder
- 1.5 tablespoon meat masala powdered

#### Method

- 1. Prepare the Base (Medium to High Heat 10 to 15 minutes): Shallow fry chopped onion, tomato, ginger, and garlic on medium to high heat until they turn soft and slightly golden. This should take around 10 to 15 minutes. Blend the mixture into a smooth puree or paste and set aside.
- 2. Cook the Chicken (High Heat 10 to 15 minutes): In the same pan, shallow fry the chicken pieces on high flame. Sprinkle some salt and turmeric while cooking. Fry until the chicken is lightly browned and sealed. This step takes around 10 to 15 minutes. Set the chicken aside.
- 3. Cook the Spices (Low Heat 3 to 5 minutes): Add a little oil to the pan. Mix your spices (meat masala, cumin & coriander powder, turmeric) in a bit of water and pour it into the pan. Cook gently on low heat for 3 to 5 minutes until the spices are roasted and aromatic.
  - 4. Combine and Simmer (High to Medium Heat 15 to 20 minutes):

Add the blended puree to the cooked spices and stir well. Let it cook for a few minutes on high heat, then reduce to medium heat. Add the shallow-fried chicken pieces and cook for another 15 to 20 minutes until the chicken is fully cooked and the flavours are well blended.
